



Connection Between Geometric Patterns and Iranian Identity

1. The Form of Flowers and Nature in Iranian Art

In Iranian culture, purple is intertwined with mystery and mysticism. During the Safavid era — and even earlier — certain aristocratic classes used shades of purple in their clothing. This color is also found in handwoven carpets from western regions of Iran.

2. Overlap and Unity in Diversity

The petals in the logo are arranged in layered, overlapping fashion, converging toward the center. This form evokes a fundamental principle in Iranian philosophy and Islamic mysticism: "Unity within multiplicity, and multiplicity within unity" — the ancient Iranian civilizational archetype of "harmonious diversity"; variety in components, yet coherence in meaning.

3. Inspired by Islamic geometric patterns

The combination of radial symmetry and the rotational arrangement of the petals closely resembles Islamic geometry. In Iranian architecture — such as the dome of Sheikh Lotfollah Mosque or the patterns found in mausoleums — circular, centrally organized structures are prevalent, bearing strong visual resemblance to the forms used in the logo.

4. Diversity of colors within a unified form — a mirror of Iranian culture.

Iranian culture has always been multicolored, multi-ethnic, multilingual, and multi-belief — yet it has preserved a unified Iranian identity. Just as in the logo, where the diverse colors of the petals converge into unity at the center, Iranian culture has followed precisely this path.

Connection Between the Logo and the Expo Theme

1. Rotational and circular form

The rotational, circular form evokes the image of a paper pinwheel — a universal toy. Across diverse cultures, from East to West, children have played with similar shapes, whether in the alleys of Iran, schools in Japan, or parks in Europe and Latin America. It is precisely this universality and simplicity that transforms the pinwheel into a fitting symbol of global movement — a shared, heartfelt language of play.

2. Overlap and Unity in Diversity

Cultural, ethnic, and linguistic diversity — aligned with the universal and inclusive spirit of the Expo.

3. Flower-like form with multiple symmetrical branches

Symbol of cooperation, synergy, and collective movement (like a music ensemble or sports team)

4. Overlapping of petals

Symbol of civilizations interacting and building a greater whole beyond individual parts.
